Wapping Wharf Developers Unveil the Next Phase




An aerial view of the proposed development from the north

Developers Umberslade and their architects from the Alec French Partnership presented their plans for Phase 2 of the development to a meeting of local residents and others in M shed on 5th June.

Residents will be aware that Phase 1 is now well under construction, and it is understood that completion is due in April 2015. In the aerial view above, those are the blocks at the western end of the site, on either side of a new pedestrian route to be called Gaol Ferry Steps, running from the existing footbridge over the New Cut, down to the newly-landscaped Museum Square on the waterfront by M shed. That first phase will contain 194 apartments, including 26 affordable homes to be managed by Knightstone Housing Association, and a row of small shops. Phase 2 will continue the development along Cumberland Road to Wapping Road, and will incorporate the old gateway to the Bristol Gaol, and the former chocolate factory behind the wall on the corner of Wapping Road.

The architects maintained that the plans for Phase 2 are broadly in accordance with the Master Plan approved in outline by the City Council in 2006, though the proposed hotel has now been moved into the next phase of the development, and will be just behind M shed. It is now proposed that the eastern end of Phase 2 will be a block of affordable housing, probably also managed by Knightstone, containing 80 units in buildings 3 and 4 storeys in height. Residents of Wapping Road present at the meeting expressed concern about the loss of aspect to their properties, and we all now have an opportunity to make representations to the developers prior to a new planning application submitted in the autumn. Amenities Company News

Roy Demery, Chair of Merchants Landing Amenities Board reports:

The AGM of the Amenities Company will take place on Friday 17th October on the John Sebastian. All shareholders to be invited.

Foxes and rats have recently been seen around the development, and residents are asked to ensure that food is not left outside, and that bins have secure lids so as not to encourage them.

Another health concern is dog fouling of our communal gardens, and residents exercising their dogs are asked to ensure that they clean up after them.

Residents will be aware that the white lines in our car-parking areas were repainted last year, but they rapidly deteriorated because of bad weather at that time; the majority of the lines have now been done again, free of charge by the contractors, and it is hoped that the remainder will be done soon. A letter was recently circulated from one of the office workers in Merchants House asking if any of our visitors car spaces were available to rent. Residents are reminded that the permits are restricted to occasional use, cannot be transferred or sold, and any abuse will result in cancellation. Lastly, a culinary note: In various parts of our communal gardens there are herbs that are freely available for residents to cut and help themselves.

Continuing our series on local place names: BATHURST BASIN & PARADE

Named after Charles Bathurst, who was MP for Bristol from 1796 to 1812. Born Charles Bragge in 1754, he changed his name to Bathurst in 1804. He held various government posts including Secretary of War, Master of the Mint, and Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster from 1812 to 1823. He was a member of the Society of Merchant Venturers and supported the slave trade. He died in 1831 aged 77.
